www.just-festival.org #justfest23 I'm delighted to be sharing the 2023 Just Festival programme, which this year is themed around 'Displacement'. We've put together a programme of art, dance, concerts and conversations that focuses on the experiences of displaced people, the meanings associated with displaced objects, and the impacts of environmental and climate displacement. When looking at the theme "Displacement", I wanted to try and capture the unease that that word can cause, and to look at the concept of displacement from multiple angles. I hope that this festival, in some small way, can bring together a few of these angles and link with our shared humanity.

"Pathways to Peace from Disparate Points" is our central installation's title, which brings together artworks created by Ukrainians and Edinburgh locals. Developed by Dr Caleb Froehlich from the Institute for Advanced Studies in Humanity at the University of Edinburgh, it explores the potential of art objects in building compassionate and constructive relationships between people from disparate points of geography, culture, and life.

In our performance programme, we are excited to be welcoming back international artists for the first time since the pandemic. Canadian dance group Dance Fachin bring their work "The Fourth R", a powerful piece of climate activism realised through dance and multimedia, and Texan baritone and guitar duo David Asbury and Bruce Cain will perform songs rooted in the beauty and mystery of the natural world. Closer to home, we have again partnered with Live Music Now Scotland for a trio of concerts, as well as with the Edinburgh Festival of Sacred Arts for "Songs of Displacement", a poignant recital of musical settings of poetry written by children in concentration camps. Edinburgh based violinist Emma Lloyd will give a concert of music for solo violin and electronics with new music organisation The Night With... that captures the aural effect of displaced sounds.

Our Just Talking series is again a key part of our programming, and we will be addressing issues of displaced cultures, the displacement and repatriation of museum objects, and the roles and responsibilities of touring artists in a displaced climate. We've also teamed up with St Mary's Cathedral for a book launch by Syrian artist Issam Kourbaj and a conversation with playwright Jo Clifford. Pathways to Peace from Disparate Points

Our central installation brings together artworks created by Ukrainians and Edinburgh locals together in five artmaking workshops in music, photography, pottery-making, loomweaving, and cooking. It explores the potential of art objects in building compassionate and constructive relationships between people from disparate points of geography, culture, and life.

The exhibition includes a photography series, hand-built pottery vessels, a loom sculpture and a musical performance. Food from the cooking workshop will be available for purchase at Pulse, a plant-based home cooking kitchen and eatery below the sanctuary of St Johns' Church.

Peacemakers' Loom

Fusing elements of contemporary art practice, craftivism and spiritual accompaniment, 'Peacemakers' focuses on peacemaking at a personal and relational level, as a response to the conflict we encounter within our lives and the wider world. Visitors are invited to join the artists in the simple action of knitting on the loom and building peace through the sharing of many small actions and kind words.

Holy Writ

This stunning sculptural textile, designed by artist Hayley Brooks, was created as a community project in 2014 in association with the 'Holy Writ' exhibition in Lichfield.

This multi-faith project reflects on 10 words that are each important, and in common, to the three Abrahamic faiths. The 10 words selected were translated into Hebrew, Greek, Latin and Arabic. Each participant chose one word, in one language/script, and worked that word onto a fabric square using a method of their own choice, for example, embroidery, collage and fabric painting.

Of Voices/Pathways

Of Voices/Pathways is part of the A+E (Arts and Ecology) programme at St Mary's Cathedral. It explores the role of artists and craft makers as they respond to the climate and ecological crisis. The work on display, responds to the climate and ecological crisis by articulating voices/pathways of creative resistance and ecological renewal. Whether framed within the language of secular or spiritual practice, these expanded forms of art/craft/film/liturgy have the power to re-root and re-route us; to transform us by any other name.

The Fourth R: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, REVOLUTIONIZE

The Fourth R is a powerful piece of contemporary dance and climate activism from Canadian group Dance Fachin. Combining compelling choreography and thought-provoking video projections, The Fourth R: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, REVOLUTIONIZE! follows the story of three individuals: a consumer, an affluent worker; a producer, CEO of Bank of Russia; and a sufferer, an impoverished individual, vulnerable to natural disasters. Each of these characters' choices (and lack thereof) affect not only them but the physical world around them. Continuing Dance Fachin's mission to create impactful work, The Fourth R: reduce, reuse, recycle, Revolutionize questions the effects of capitalism on our environment.

The Fourth R is an energized look into the people and behaviours that fuel one of the most pressing topics on planet Earth: global warming. The piece revolves around three characters who are emblematic of three major players in this crisis: those that produce, those that consume, and those that suffer. The spirit of this piece is in the fact that we are all reflected in one or more of these characters, and their trials and even shortcomings resonate universally.

Songs of the Universe

Bruce Cain and David Asbury are a baritone and guitar duo from Georgetown, Texas. They have performed together for nearly 25 years, playing throughout the US, and in Europe, Australia and Morocco. They have had more than thirty works written for them, and their programmes contain themes of environmental activism, conservation and the beauty and mystery of the natural world.

Performing in English and Spanish, Bruce and David bring an eclectic programme of moving works written over the past century by American, European and Latinx composers.

Displacement

Two song cycles by Lori Laitman exploring displacement in WW2 performed by Calum Robertson (clarinet) and Sally Carr (soprano). In conjunction with the Edinburgh Festival of the Sacred Arts, this highly accomplished duo will perform Laitman's setting of two poetical works: I Never Saw Another Butterfly is a collection of poems written by children at the time of the Holocaust; and The Ocean of Eternity is a setting of four poems reflecting on the experience of Jews in Nazi Germany. Written by Anne Ranasinghe (1925 – 2016), a German born Jewish poet, she subsequently became one of Sri Lanka's leading English language poets and won several international awards.

<u>Displaced Sounds: The</u> <u>Night With... Emma Lloyd</u>

Just Festival is excited to have partnered with The Night With... for the first time. This concert of solo violin and electronics. Electronically affected sounds blur with natural effects of the building's reverb, giving an aural impression of displacement to the listener.

The Night With... is a new music organisation based in Glasgow presenting salon style concerts of interesting music in intimate, informal venues across Scotland and further afield. Run by composer and electronic performer Matthew Whiteside, it provides development and commissioning opportunities for young and emerging composers.

Emma Lloyd is an international performer, improviser, composer, and artist. She performs as a soloist and in small ensembles, working often with live electronics, and collaborating regularly with composers. In addition to the modern set-up, she plays a baroque violin and performs both baroque and contemporary music written specifically for this instrument.

As an improviser, Emma's performance

As an improviser, Emma's performance tends to be quiet and intimate in nature, exploring the innate timbral qualities of the violin, and discovering some of the often hidden sounds that can be found with her unique combination of technique and tools.

The Fountaineers

The Fountaineers are an American roots and Bluegrass group based in Glasgow. Callum MT (mandolin), Jeri Foreman (fiddle), Michael Wright (guitar/vocals) and Rob Hart (banjo) are creating music that adheres to traditions, fosters creativity and blends the progressive intent found in shared musical heroes such as Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs, Tony Rice and Allison Krauss and Union Station.

Penny James and Matt Tighe

Penny James and Matthew Tighe are a classical and traditional violin/fiddle duo located in Glasgow. The pair studied classical music at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance, where in a sea of classical musicians they found each other through a mutual love of traditional Irish and Scottish music, which led to the formation of the duo in 2014.

Saudade Duo

The Saudade Duo is a half-Cuban, half-Italian ensemble comprised of violinist Eddy Betancourt and guitarist Jacopo Lazzaretti. They created the Suadade Duo in 2022 to explore the possibilities of the guitar and violin repertoire together, with the goal of bringing live music to as many people as possible.

Eddy Betancourt is a virtuoso violinist from Cuba, currently based in Glasgow. He graduated from the Conservatory of Vigo (Spain), the University of Aveiro (Portugal), the Conservatorium Van Amsterdam and the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

Jacopo Lazzaretti is a versatile guitarist from Rome, currently based in Glasgow. He graduated from the Conservatoire of Santa Cecilia in Rome in 2017 and completed the Master's Degree in Performance at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in June 2019.
